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Scaling Local Agriculture in Tshwane



In celebration of Entrepreneurs Month, the Tshwane Economic Development Agency (TEDA) visited two farms in Winterveld on 11 November 2025. Accompanied by the City of Tshwane's Department of Rural



Development and EDSPD (Economic Development and Spatial Planning Department), Environment and Agriculture Department and TEDA-first met with the founder of Winterveld Poultry Abattoir, Ntombikayise Matjene, before meeting Dimakatso Ramahlodi from Maledi Fresh.



During the first visit, TEDA met Ntombikayise (known as Ntombi), a self-taught farmer who currently employs 20 people from the local community. The abattoir slaughters up to 120 chickens per hour and services clients beyond Tshwane's borders, illustrating that business is not limited by demand but by the conditions under which it must operate.



Like any business, the abattoir faces challenges. The challenges Ntombi faces are not uncommon among township and informal-economy entrepreneurs, yet they directly affect the sustainability and growth of her business. In Ntombi's case,



1. The high cost of relying on a generator during loadshedding places immense financial strain on daily operations.
2. Feeding costs account for most of her expenditure.
3. Ongoing security concerns require staff to be redirected from productive roles to guarding the premises.
4. Most critically, despite having the capacity to supply large institutions, access to broader and more stable markets remains her primary obstacle.



Despite these obstacles, Ntombi remains optimistic, diversifying into vegetable production and actively implementing a skills programme titled “One Household One Garden” through which learners are trained in poultry production and vegetable farming. Ntombi’s approach demonstrates a clear understanding that sustainability lies in both diversification and community empowerment.

After meeting with Ntombi, TEDA and the City of Tshwane representatives proceeded to Maledi Fresh, where Dimakatso and her community met the team. Dimakatso, who holds an MSc in Food Sciences and brings over 15 years of industry experience to her farming practice, founded Maledi Fresh, where she supplies organic produce to markets beyond Tshwane.



Dimakatso’s farming approach is rooted in deliberate sustainability. From using natural fertilisers to planting marigolds for pest control, every aspect of the farm is designed to preserve soil integrity and produce high-quality organic foods. Her operation is informed by both scientific knowledge and practical experience.



Yet, like Ntombi, Dimakatso’s limitations are structural rather than operational. The absence of a packhouse restricts Dimakatso’s ability to aggregate produce from other small farmers and leverage her existing market access for the broader community.



In response, Dimakatso also diversified her offerings, developing natural hair care products made with farm-based ingredients to generate additional income. Her long-term vision is not confined to her own business growth but extends to reducing unemployment within Winterveld through cooperative development and skills transfer.

What this visit to Winterveld revealed is that Entrepreneurship in Tshwane is not defined by potential alone, but by individuals who have already laid the groundwork for economic participation and are now positioned for expansion, provided that the right support mechanisms are in place.



This is where TEDA's mandate becomes significant, to bridge the gap between production and market access, between operational resilience and sustainable growth, and between individual entrepreneurial effort and coordinated institutional support.



Through business support, market linkage, stakeholder facilitation, and collaboration with various government departments and partners, TEDA and City of Tshwane work to ensure that entrepreneurs are not left to navigate systemic challenges in isolation and is committed to strengthen these efforts, unlocking further opportunity, and ensuring that entrepreneurs who are already contributing meaningfully to the economy are supported to grow even further.



Tshwane Raises Its Flags Ahead of G20



On 13 November 2025, the City of Tshwane marked its readiness for the upcoming G20 Leaders' Summit and Urban 20 engagements with a symbolic flag hoisting ceremony at Fountain Circle in Pretoria. Attended by Executive Mayor Dr Nasiphi Moya, Deputy Mayor, Cllr Eugene Modise and senior officials from the city and delegates from the Tshwane Economic Development Agency (TEDA), the event signaled Tshwane's intention to present itself as an investment-ready city on the global stage.



This initiative stemmed from South Africa's role as host of the G20 in 2025 for the first time on the African soil, a responsibility that places Tshwane at the center of global attention. As the administrative capital, Tshwane was expected to welcome high-level delegations and reflect the country's readiness, capability and identity through its public environment.





The city's preparation work was therefore significant, as it strengthens national representation, supports diplomatic protocols, and helps position Tshwane as a world-class destination for investment, tourism, and international engagement.



"Our primary goal for the G20 is to elevate Tshwane's profile, establishing it as a top investable global destination. We will provide our ambassadors with all the necessary data on our high-yield investments, so they can effectively promote Tshwane's economic success. The most significant benefit is the global positioning of Tshwane, showcasing a capital city that truly reflects South Africa's potential and dynamic identity to the world," said Dr Moya during her address at the ceremony.



The beautification initiative forms part of this readiness plan and is already being implemented across Pretoria East. The programme focuses on creating tidier and enhanced public spaces to present a clean, attractive and welcoming environment for international guests. A key component of this work is the city's comprehensive flag programme, which reinforces national and city branding and contributes to a strong visual legacy long after the summit concludes.

ACTOM Group Revives SGB-SMIT Power Matla, Restoring 250 Jobs



The 3RD of December 2025 marked the official reopening of the SGB-SMIT Power Matla Plant, located in Pretoria West, marking more than the return of operations at a historic manufacturing site. The reopening of this power station signaled the restoration of 250 jobs and renewed confidence in local industrial capacity within the City of Tshwane (CoT).



The facility, now operating under the stewardship of the ACTOM Group, was formally reopened following its acquisition in January 2025.





The revival of the power station reflects a deliberate commitment to strengthening local manufacturing capacity and advancing industrialisation as a driver of economic growth and inclusion. Addressing stakeholders at the opening, ACTOM Group Chief Executive Officer Mr Mervyn Naidoo emphasised the importance of producing locally to address unemployment, inequality and underutilised industrial infrastructure.



CoT Executive Mayor, Dr Nasiphi Moya, welcomed the reopening as a tangible example of what coordinated public and private sector partnership can achieve, particularly in restoring livelihoods and stimulating economic activity within the CoT.



The presence of the Tshwane Economic Development Agency (TEDA) underscored its role in facilitating strategic investment, strengthening stakeholder collaboration and supporting initiatives that translate into measurable economic impact. Strengthening Intercontinental Collaboration With TEDA And SAEEC At CEIIF 2026 In Zambia



The Tshwane Economic Development Agency (TEDA), in partnership with the South African Electrotechnical Export Council (SAEEEC), participated in the Continental Energy and Infrastructure Investment Forum (CEIIF) 2026 held in Lusaka, Zambia. The four-day forum, which ran from 2 - 5 February 2026, brought together policymakers, investors, and industry leaders from across the continent to explore opportunities in Africa's growing energy and infrastructure sectors.



As part of its mandate to promote investment and market access for Tshwane-based businesses, TEDA facilitated the participation of five companies from the City of Tshwane at the forum. The initiative aimed to provide these businesses with opportunities to connect with Zambian companies and explore potential collaborations within the energy, infrastructure and manufacturing value chain.

Through its partnership with SAESEC, TEDA created a platform that strengthened intercontinental business relationships while showcasing the capabilities of Tshwane-based companies within the broader African market. The forum enabled meaningful business-to-business engagements, knowledge exchange, and investment dialogue.

Beyond the conference programme, the TEDA delegation participated in strategic engagements and site visits, including a visit to the Lusaka South MultiFacility Economic Zone, one of Zambia's key industrial development hubs. The zone hosts several major international investors such as British American Tobacco and MarcoPolo Tiles, among others.



The visit provided valuable insights into Zambia's industrial development strategy and highlighted opportunities for cross-border trade, manufacturing partnerships, and investment collaboration.

The delegation also held meetings with the Zambia Development Agency (ZDA) and the Zambia Chamber of Commerce and Industry, strengthening institutional relationships and opening avenues for future cooperation between the two regions.

As part of these engagements, TEDA is currently in the process of formalising a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Zambia Development Agency (ZDA). The agreement is expected to support increased collaboration in areas such as trade promotion, investment facilitation, export development, and business support between Tshwane and Zambia.



TEDA's participation in CEIIF 2026 reflects its ongoing commitment to building strong intercontinental partnerships that create opportunities for Tshwane based businesses while positioning the City of Tshwane as a gateway for investment and economic collaboration across the African continent.

TEDA Empowers Local SMMEs With 2026 SMME Symposium



On 10 March 2026, the Tshwane Economic Development Agency (TEDA) hosted the 2026 instalment of the Small, Medium, and Micro Enterprises (SMME) Symposium. This collaborative initiative was delivered in strategic partnership with the South African Electrotechnical Export Council (SAEEC) and The Innovation Hub, marking a significant milestone in the city's economic strategy. Held at The Innovation Hub in Lynnwood, Pretoria, the event served as a high-impact platform for SMMEs operating within the Automotive, Digital Technology, Electronics, and Energy sectors.



The Executive Mayor of the City of Tshwane, Dr Nasiphi Moya, delivered a powerful message: "When entrepreneurs succeed, cities rise. And when cities rise, countries prosper." The mayor highlighted that Tshwane is a critical engine of the South African economy, contributing over R500 billion to the national GDP annually. With more than 240,000 registered businesses and one of the largest concentrations of scientists and engineers on the continent, the city is uniquely positioned to lead industrial growth.

The mayor echoed the sentiments of the National Development Plan (NDP) 2030, which identifies SMMEs as the true backbone of the economy, with the ambitious goal of these enterprises creating 90% of all new jobs by the end of the decade. Aligning with this national vision, the city has set clear local targets: to grow Tshwane's economy by between 3.3% and 4.6% Gross Value Added (GVA) by 2029, effectively supporting the creation of approximately 80,000 jobs over the next five years.

The symposium also facilitated high-level engagements between the City's leadership and industry giants. The Deputy Executive Mayor, Cllr Eugene Modise and MMC for Economic Development and Spatial Planning, Cllr Sarah Mabotsa, met with representatives from Actom and TEDA to explore practical ways to bolster investment and industrial growth.



The symposium served as a vital showcase of the practical ecosystem the Tshwane Economic Development Agency (TEDA) has operationalised on behalf of the city. As the primary vehicle for trade and investment. In 2025 alone, these coordinated efforts supported 1,050 SMMEs, with a specific focus on inclusive growth through the empowerment of 179 cooperatives and 399 youth-owned enterprises.



Beyond the important speeches, the heart of the symposium was the vibrant exhibition floor. Here, the practical ecosystem came to life as local innovators from the Automotive, Digital Tech, and Energy sectors demonstrated their capabilities. The symposium featured a diverse range of SMMEs and programmes, including notable exhibitors such as: Imas, Lindiwe Sanitary Pads, Themba liyeza, Take Note IT, PtSA (Production Technologies Association of South Africa) BizbuddySA, Laphora Incubation Programme and many others.

The 2026 symposium's effectiveness is best demonstrated by the return of several high-calibre enterprises who also participated in the 2025 symposium. Their continued engagement underscores the tangible value and market access that this platform provides to local industry leaders. These key returning exhibitors who are once again showcasing their cutting-edge solutions include: Afrison LED, QP Drone Energy, and Rethuseng Live Line Solutions.



The exhibition allowed SMMEs to engage directly with the supply chains and business opportunities that lie within the programmes and initiatives of various corporations and government entities. This face-to-face networking is a cornerstone of TEDA's mission: ensuring that local businesses are not just seen but are actively integrated into the wider industrial value chain. Ultimately, the symposium served as a powerful reminder that when we bridge the gap between innovation and opportunity, we pave the way for a more inclusive and prosperous Tshwane for all.

Strengthening Strategic Partnerships to Enhance Gauteng's Investment Environment



The Tshwane Economic Development Agency (TEDA) participated at the ease of doing business engagement session hosted by the Gauteng Growth and Development Agency (GGDA) partnership with the Spanish Chamber of Commerce in South Africa. The engagement formed part of a series of provincial activations taking place in anticipation of the Gauteng Investment Conference scheduled for 9 April 2026, aimed at strengthening investor engagement and improving the ease of doing business within the province.



For TEDA, the session also provided an important opportunity to strengthen its strategic relationship with the Spanish Chamber of Commerce, with whom the agency has an existing Memorandum of Understanding focused on promoting trade, investment cooperation and business partnerships between Spanish companies and the City of Tshwane. Through this collaboration, TEDA and the Spanish Chamber of Commerce continue to explore opportunities to facilitate investment, support business expansion and strengthen economic ties between Spanish investors and the Tshwane economy.



Discussions at the activation highlighted areas of collaboration between government and the private sector to see how collaborations can help unlock new investment opportunities, particularly in sectors linked to infrastructure, energy and economic development. For the Spanish business community, engagements such as these provide a platform to share insights on their experiences operating in Gauteng while identifying ways to strengthen the investment environment for future projects. The dialogue also enables institutions such as TEDA to better understand investor needs and tailor support mechanisms that facilitate business establishment and growth.



TEDA continues to view its partnership with the Spanish Chamber of Commerce as an important gateway for international investment into Tshwane, particularly as global companies increasingly seek competitive locations that offer strong infrastructure, market access and a supportive investment ecosystem.

From Dialogue to Delivery: Strengthening Water Security Through Strategic Partnerships



As part of the ongoing activations leading up to the Gauteng Investment Conference, the Gauteng Growth and Development Agency (GGDA) has launched a province-wide engagement series titled Ease of Doing Business, aimed at strengthening investor confidence and addressing key constraints within the business environment.

The Tshwane Economic Development Agency (TEDA) recently participated in one of these engagements, hosted in collaboration with the Southern African German Chamber of Commerce and Industry, which brought together government stakeholders and members of the German business community to engage on practical solutions to investment challenges



Key interventions highlighted include progress on the Lesotho Highlands Water Project, which will introduce additional dam infrastructure to support the Vaal River system, a vital resource underpinning Gauteng's industrial and economic activity. This long-term solution is expected to significantly enhance water security across the province. As part of their short-term plans, government is exploring alternative and complementary water solutions, including collaboration with the Tugela Water System in KwaZulu-Natal, to help stabilise supply while long-term infrastructure projects are being implemented.

For TEDA, the session offered valuable insights into how infrastructure planning and investment attraction are increasingly interconnected. Engagements with partners such as the German Chamber provide an important opportunity to understand investor concerns in real time and align institutional responses accordingly. The inclusion of German companies in the dialogue further reinforced the importance of practical, business-informed perspectives, particularly in sectors where water reliability is essential to operations. These insights are critical in shaping a more responsive and investor-friendly environment.



Through its partnership with the GGDA, TEDA continues to strengthen its role as a connector between international investors and government stakeholders, ensuring that key issues affecting the investment climate are both understood and addressed collaboratively to enhance infrastructure resilience, strengthen stakeholder collaboration, and unlock new opportunities for inclusive economic growth.

TEDA Drives Continued Growth For Tshwane's Leading Women Entrepreneurs



This quarter, the Tshwane Economic Development Agency (TEDA) has concluded its first round of follow-up visits with the 2025 Tshwane Women in Business Awards (TWIBA) winners to provide ongoing aftercare and business support.



The visits were part of TEDA's commitment to ensuring that TWIBA serves not only as a platform for recognition but also as a catalyst for continued business growth. Through these engagements, TEDA assessed each business's progress since the awards and identified areas where further support and intervention could accelerate their expansion.

This quarter, TEDA visited six exceptional women-led businesses operating across various regions of Tshwane, each contributing meaningfully to economic activity, job creation, and community development.

Among the businesses visited was MM Fleet Services and Maintenance, led by Nthabiseng Makgoale, winner in the Automotive Sector. The business provides professional fleet maintenance solutions tailored to commercial vehicle operators across multiple industries.



TEDA also visited Incognito Spa and Events in Pretoria North, led by Aretha Manasoe, runner-up in the Tourism Sector. The business offers venue hire and event planning services for milestone celebrations and special occasions, providing clients with a seamless end-to-end planning experience.



In the Manufacturing Sector, TEDA engaged with Lindiwe Sanitary Pads, founded by Lindiwe Nkuna Kgopa, whose large-scale sanitary pad manufacturing plant has become a notable example of women-led industrial growth while creating employment opportunities for dozens of women.



TEDA further visited Setjhoka Farm in Bronkhorstspuit, operated by Anelly Mokwena, winner in Agriculture and Agro Processing. The 650-hectare farming operation combines large-scale maize production and cattle farming, representing the strength and scalability of women-led agribusiness in Tshwane.



Also visited was Themba Liyeza Solutions, led by Nomathemba Seleonor Selesho, a growing logistics and freight operator based in Bronkhorstspuit. The business has established itself within the traditionally male-dominated transport sector through its reliable bulk commodity and agricultural freight services.



Completing the visits was Curly Crowns, founded by Pontsho Dibakwane, Manufacturing Sector runner-up. The business is redefining hair care by developing products specifically formulated for Black African hair, focusing on promoting healthy hair growth and restoring hair vitality.



These businesses reflect the calibre of women entrepreneurship emerging across Tshwane and demonstrate the increasingly important role women-owned businesses play in driving inclusive economic growth across the city.

Through initiatives such as TWIBA and its structured aftercare programme, TEDA remains committed not only to recognising women entrepreneurs but also to actively supporting their long-term sustainability, competitiveness, and expansion.

Tshwane Reaffirms Its Position As An Investment Destination



The City of Tshwane continues to send a strong and consistent message to the market: Tshwane is open for business and actively positioning itself as a leading investment destination.

This commitment was reaffirmed during a strategic oversight visit to the InvestSA One Stop Shop (OSS), housed at the Tshwane Economic Development Agency (TEDA). There is a clear and deliberate shift towards positioning Tshwane as an active partner in the investment journey, one that is committed to unlocking value and supporting investors from initial enquiry through to project execution.

The session also showcased a pipeline of significant investment proposals. Many of these projects are anchored in manufacturing, industrial development, and infrastructure expansion, sectors that are critical to driving sustainable economic growth in the City.

The emphasis on localisation and industrial capacity reflects Tshwane's strategic intent to not only attract investment, but to ensure that it translates into meaningful economic participation and long-term value for the City.





As global economic trends continue to evolve, Tshwane is sharpening its focus on sectors that offer high growth potential. This includes areas such as data infrastructure, digital economy opportunities, and advanced manufacturing. By aligning its investment promotion efforts with these emerging sectors, the City is positioning itself to remain competitive while responding to the demands of a rapidly changing global economy.



Platforms such as the One Stop Shop remain central to this vision. By providing a coordinated, investor-focused interface, the City is able to streamline processes, enhance service delivery, and build confidence among both local and international investors. 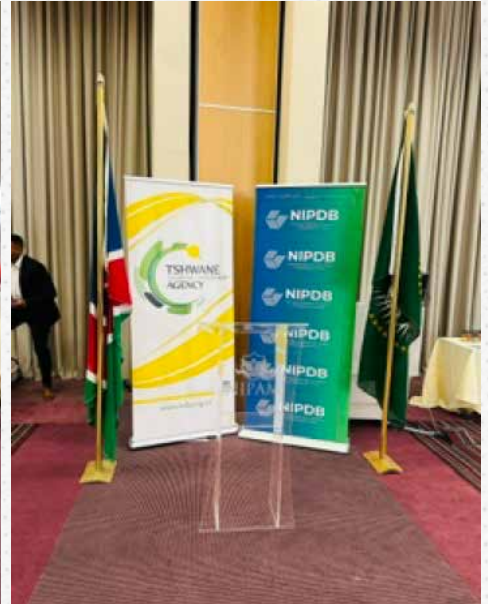

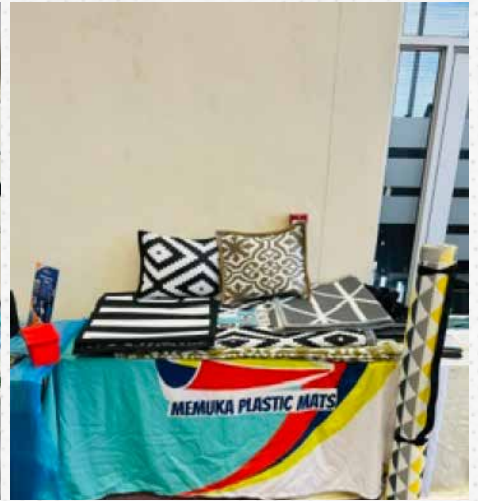

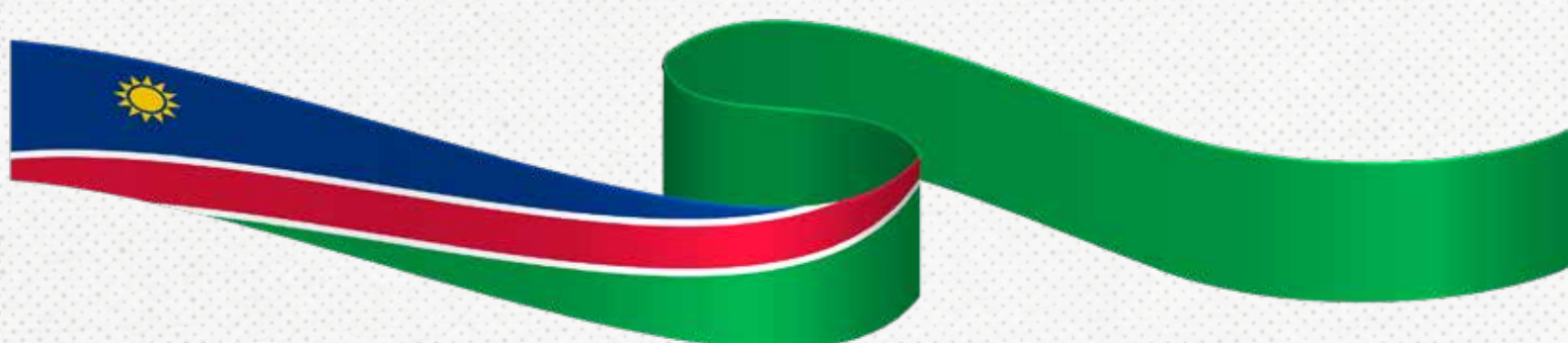
